HIS YEAR'S IRIS SHOW was a little later than usual, and it conflicted with the annual show of the Monterey Bay Rose Society, which happens regularly on the first Saturday of May.

This year's scheduling conflict wasn't a great problem, because interested gardeners could easily attend both shows. It was a barrier, however, for entering blossoms in both shows for those who participate in both groups.

Charley Kearns explained how we schedule our show:

"We need to pick our show date about 6 to 9 months in advance. The most critical factor is obtaining American Iris Society certified judges. We also make sure we don't conflict with other AIS regional or national events. The only dates that worked, this year, was May 7th & 8th. Not conflicting with other local garden events is desirable, but sometimes cannot be avoided. Although we have had our show early May for the past few years, that is not always the case."

Apart from that glitch, the show was a great success. I expect that Show Chairman Kearns has provided a full report of the show elsewhere in this issue of Bay News. I need not repeat that information, but I will add my thanks to the many MBIS members who made this event successful by volunteering their time and contributing gorgeous blossoms.

JLTURE TIPS



FTER A VERY WET WINTER, the rains stopped about a month ago with wind and

heat dried the soil out. If your soil is clay or has lots of it in it, it turns to concrete if it wasn't worked up some before the drying occurred. Water your iris as they are blooming for maximum performance and a weekly deep watering until late June will promote the growth and help the rhizomes to size up. After that time little to no water is necessary.

Snap out or cut out the spent stalks. It makes the garden look better and also focuses the growth into the rhizomes. Hopefully you checked to see if they were properly labelled and your labels and charts corrected accordingly. *** Joe

2011 MBIS SHOW REPORT

We had 156 entries: 142 named varieties and 16 seedlings. Although we didn't expect to have as many entries this year, we had 18 more than last year. The display was quite impressive. The entries for named varieties were: Lisa Ayala (27), Joe Ghio (22) and Charley Kearns (21). Joe Ghio also entered 16 seedlings. Among named varieties, there were 38 blues, 42 reds, 39 whites, 7 honorable mentions and 13 not judged. The 16 seedlings won 8 blues. The judging was much stricter this year producing fewer blue and red ribbons.

The Artistic Section had. 13 entries. All were beautiful and very popular with the public. Lisa Ayala won Best Design with her *New Horizons* arrangement. Pat Lindstrom won People's Choice with her *Tea for Two* creation. We are delighted that Sarah Hackforth's flower arranging class at Soquel High participated in our show. Four students entered an artistic arrangement, one winning best of section. Thanks for your contribution.

We want to thank all the participants, and encourage more to participate next year.
